Senate battleground survey: Working women and men's economic agenda tilts the races

July 22, 2014





Methodology

This presentation is based on a unique survey of 1,000 likely 2014 voters in the most competitive Senate races across the country, conducted by Greenberg Quinlan Rosner Research for Democracy Corps and Women's Voices Women Vote Action Fund

This survey was conducted from July 12-16, 2014 using a list of 2006 voters, 2010 voters, and new registrants. Unless otherwise noted, the margin of error for the full sample is = +/-3.10% at 95% confidence.

50 percent of respondents were reached by cell phone, in order to account for everchanging demographics and trying to accurately sample the full American electorate.

WVWVAF is a 501(c)(4) social welfare organization. It participated in this survey to gather information about how to improve civic engagement of under-represented segments of the American population.

Background and Trend Information

The Democracy Corps Senate battleground research is one of a kind. Nobody else conducts a poll only in the most competitive Democratic and Republican seats, using the actual names of the incumbents in each district.

We include comparisons to a survey done in June, 2014 in partnership with NPR and Resurgent Republic. While the states remain the same, the July survey is the only survey to use actual names of incumbents and call voters that are likely to vote in the 2014 November election.

Respondents were selected off of a voter list who voted in the 2006 or 2010 off-year elections or new registrants with a high intention to vote in 2014.

- > 81 percent of respondents are white.
- > 9 percent of these voters are under 30
- > 3 percent are Latino and 10 percent African American.

Key Findings

- Unmarried women are, perhaps, the most important target for Democrats across this senate battleground.
- ➤ The senate race in this battleground is tied and stable, with Democrats held back by underperformance among base RAE voters and unmarried women.
- ➤ The Democratic incumbents in this battleground are much better liked than Obama and have significantly higher ratings than their Republican opponents.
- ➤ Two dynamics could shift this race: the president's approval in these states is just 37 percent, but stable. Meanwhile, the Republican Party, and particularly the Republicans in the House, are extremely unpopular. And regressions show that sentiment about House Republicans drives the SENATE vote more strongly than sentiment about Senate Republicans.
- ➤ Democrats have a message that can move the vote. A populist economic narrative, including strong messaging around the women's economic agenda, moves the vote in Democrats' favor when matched against a Republican economic narrative with big gains in the open-seat race and the state that Obama won in 2012.

Key Findings


- ➤ A critique of Republicans for their positions on seniors, women's economic issues and women's health are powerful and help move the vote among younger voters and women, as well as help move the vote in some of the most competitive races in the battleground.
- ➤ And a debate about money in politics, particularly over a Constitutional Amendment to repeal Citizens United and a proposal to get big money out of our campaign system, results in further gains.
- ➤ Exposing unmarried women to the economic message shifts their support for Senate Democrats from +11 to +20.
- ➤ The economic agenda for working women and men includes a cluster of powerful policies on helping working mothers, equal pay and equal health insurance, and making sure that the wealthy and big corporations pay their fair share.
- Unmarried women are the pivotal group of the debate, as Democrats currently underperform even their 2010 margin significantly, but these voters move strongly in response to the debate.
- ➤ Voters in this Republican-leaning district are split on the electoral impact of the Republican candidate supporting the Hobby Lobby decision, but the issue provides an opening for Democrats to make a powerful critique on Republicans on the issue of women's health. The issue is very powerful with unmarried women and other key blocs of women.



Obama Approval at 37 percent in the Battleground, stable from June




Republican and Democratic parties at parity, even though battleground went heavily for Romney




Democratic incumbents have split approval and are 6 points better than Obama




Democratic candidates with better ratings than their GOP challengers

Senate battleground split on repeal, though opponents much more intense





Named Senate Vote Stable and Even


Thinking about the election for Senate in November, if the election for U.S. Senate were held today, would you be voting for -- (Democratic candidate) or (Republican candidate)?*


Race tied across Battleground, big difference by Tier

Thinking about the election for Senate in November, if the election for U.S. Senate were held today, would you be voting for -- (Democratic candidate) or (Republican candidate)?




Democratic incumbents even in race, despite Republican tilt of their states

Thinking about the election for Senate in November, if the election for U.S. Senate were held today, would you be voting for -- (Democratic candidate) or (Republican candidate)?




An Economic Agenda for hard working women and men


"In your shoes" narrative as strong as Republican narrative in these Republican-leaning states




Working mothers, minimum wage schooling biggest drivers in regressions






Strong attacks on Republicans. GOP most vulnerable on seniors but women's economic and women's health critiques also potent


Women's policy proposals are the strongest




Attacks on Republicans on women's health and economy are convincing reasons for unmarried women to vote

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(WOMENS HEALTH) (Republican candidate) is too focused on women's private lives instead of jobs and the economy. (He/she) supports the recent Supreme Court ruling allowing big corporations to deny their female employees health insurance coverage for contraception, even when the employee's health is in danger. (Republican candidate) also supports a plan that would cut women's access to preventative. healthcare services like mammograms, cancer screenings and prenatal care.




(WOMEN'S ECONOMY) More and more women are breadwinners for their families, but they are making and keeping less than they should. But even though women make just 77 cents for every dollar men make, (Republican candidate) is opposed to requiring equal pay for women who do the same job as a man. And (Republican candidate) supports a plan that would allow insurance companies to charge women higher premiums than men and force women to pay for preventive care like mammograms.




Republican attacks on Democrats resonate less







Economic debate results in small gains for Democrats




Big gains with unmarried women
