

Trump's engaged party defining the battle for 2022

May 14, 2021

2022 Congressional, Senate, and gubernatorial battleground, with large oversample of Republicans

METHODOLOGY & DEFINITION OF BATTLEGROUND

A battleground phone poll of 1,000 registered voters, with an oversample of 500 Republicans was conducted by phone April 27-May 3, 2021 from a voter-file sample. 67% of respondents were reached on cell phones in order to accurately reflect the American electorate. The margin of error is +/- 3.5 percentage points.

Key Findings:

- Trump's loyalists and aligned voters are 75 percent of the GOP in the 2022 battleground and importantly, are already consolidated and engaged in support of Trump's unfinished fight for America.
- The critical bloc of non-Trump conservatives and moderates is only a quarter of the battleground electorate — compared to 30 percent in our national poll last month. They are vocal in opposition to Trump, many approve of Biden, and even more could abstain or vote 3rd party.
- Our polls are adjusted to reflect what I learned dealing with right-wing populist parties: it maintains the 2020 proportion who are white noncollege, as well as their recalled vote for Trump. It shows the Trump loyalists, Republicans, and white working class voters as much more engaged than Democrats, with Trump still able to shape events.
- High interest is not as high as a presidential year, but it is comparable to 2018, suggesting the era of high turnout elections is not over.



Key Findings:

- Trump's continuing battle to reverse an election stolen by Democrats and Black voters brings out the drivers of GOP identity — deep hostility to Black Lives Matter, undocumented immigrants, and Antifa.
- There is no escaping the reality that Trump's Republican Party is a selfconsciously and self-confidently anti-democratic, anti-immigrant party that will battle for the future of white people in a multicultural America.
- The non-Trump Republicans are now vocal in their opposition to the GOP's current direction, but Republican primaries will only confirm Trump's ascendancy. Only the defeat of this this anti-democratic, racist party in an election where it loses power can bring change.
- The parties are tied in the generic congressional, but fortunately, Biden gives Democrats a headwind: 49 percent approve, with a net 4 points more positive than negative. That contrasts with Trump who has a negative 5-point net approval rating. And there are Biden Republicans.




Key Findings:

- The congressional generic of 45 to 45 to percent) is produced by the complete consolidation of Republicans, while more Democrats are undecided. Importantly, Democrats are ahead by 3 points in the House seats. Blacks, unmarried women, and probably Asian Americans (AAPI) are delivering, but not Hispanics on and Millennials/Gen-Z voters on turnout.
- Health care could be key again: almost one-fifth of non-Trump conservatives and one third of moderates are warm to Obamacare.
- Democrats and Biden need to show that they are helping people in historic ways, and it will all be put at risk if Republicans retake the Congress.
- And this time, Democrats cannot fail to see how Trump's party is fully engaged with its ongoing culture war, focused on crime, open borders, and defunding the police. Democrats are at risk of repeating 2020 if they do not prioritize defusing and neutralizing it.






Trump's Loyalists and aligned fully $3/4^{th}$ in 2022 battleground – and will play a big part in the fights ahead






They are deeply engaged — led by the 58% of GOP who are Trump loyalists — and alarmingly, Democrats are barely following politics





Trump kept Republicans highly engaged, but major pull back from election; Democrats pulled back much more, but both at level indicating in high turnout era







Fortunately, Biden has 49 percent approval in battleground, and gives Democrats a headwind: net +4 compared to -5 for Trump

Do you approve or disapprove of Joe Biden/Donald Trump?










Biden Republicans? While 3 in 5 Trump loyalists are intensely anti-Biden, other factions less hostile and some warm to him.






Tied vote for Congress produced by early GOP consolidation fighting nationally while Democrats more undecided; but lead in congressional battleground








Blacks and unmarried women game on, likely with AAPI; but not Hispanics and millennials






Drivers of Trump's loyalist GOP




Republicans united in intense hostility to Black Lives Matter; only moderates split






Preventing discrimination *against white people* animates Trump loyalists and aligned – 75% of party






GOP united and at war against Antifa — the leftist anarchists **GOP** blames for all white violence






80% of Trump's loyalist extremely hostile to undocumented immigrants, and 2/3rds of Trump aligned








Pro-life is raison d'être for Evangelical Trump loyalists, and nearly all Republicans remain socially conservative






'MAGA' identity at the heart of Trump loyalist energy: they are 60 percent of the party
