

Duh, it's the economy stupid!

Election Day survey

November 6-8, 2022

METHODOLOGY

Democracy Corps conducted a national web survey with 2,520 voters from Nov. 6-8, 2022. The data include a base sample of 1,390 registered voters, with oversamples of 330 Black voters, 360 Hispanic voters, and 440 Asian American voters, for a total of 500 respondents in each group. The oversample data are statistically weighted to ensure the sample's regional, age, and gender composition reflects that of 2022 midterm voters in the United States.

The total data set of 2,520 registered voters (1,390 base sample plus 1,130 oversample of voters of color) were weighted down to an effective sample size of 1,000, nationally representative of midterm voters. The sample used the Edison exit poll findings for proportions on race, age, and gender, but we maintained the unique methodology of this project by raising the non-college proportion by 6 percent (to reflect the accepted bias of prior exit polls). And it weighted the cultural thermometers (NRA and pro-life groups), to offset the bias of on-line panels. The vote result matched the actual vote in 2022 without have to weight the vote itself.

The total sample of 2,520 Registered Voters (1,000 Weighted) includes:

- 788 Registered Voters in Battleground States (350 Weighted)
- ➤ 1000 White Voters (730 Weighted)
- 500 Black/African-American Voters (110 Weighted)
- > 500 Hispanic/Latino Voters (110 Weighted)
- > 500 Asian American (AAPI) Voters (20 Weighted)



Key questions

- With so much discontent and despair on the state of the country and economy, why did Democrats not face historic losses in the House and Senate? How did voters manage to set aside the unpopularity of President Biden and the Democratic Congress and decide at the very end to turnout and vote for Democrats?
- Democrats lost the popular vote by 2.6 percent, as our polls predicted, and Republicans have a 3-point advantage in party identification. So, will Democrats be complacent and fail to bring the big changes needed to be competitive again? Unlike 2022, Senate Democrats will be defending in many Trump states.
- President Biden has already declared that Democrats surprised pundits and analysts because the
 economy, in reality, was very strong; voters endorsed his bipartisan efforts and welcomed the
 accomplishments of the Democrats. With the Republican control bound to be very close, DCCC leaders
 will be tempted to do the same. Will others embrace those self-serving conclusions completely
 contradicted by the data before and after the election?
- This will be the 2nd election in a row where the top problems of the country are economy and discontent driven by anger about the economy, yet those voting for the Democratic House candidates cite no economic reasons to support them. Will Democrats settle to be a party without any economic projects?
- Democrats face current and future problems with Asian and Hispanic voters. Will Democrats do what is necessary to have an inclusive, engaged base?
- Do analysts realize how close this election was to going badly wrong? An astonishing 1/4 of voters
 decided their vote a few days before or on Election Day. Twice as many Democratic voters considered
 voting for the Republicans, and they enjoyed double digit advantages on inflation, crime, and the border.

What happened?

- The biggest factor was Democrats putting aside their doubts and becoming as unified as the Republicans —
 deciding in the end to support the Democrats because of abortion, threats to Social Security and democracy. All
 three were equally important in this poll, and national Democrats were right to add democracy in the closing
 week.
- Abortion was key to the Senate wins and state elections where Republican control would mean abortion becoming illegal.
- With election deniers prominent in the election, Donald Trump became a bigger factor in the election than Joe Biden, even though Biden was slightly less popular. GOP candidates wore a stamp that said, "I'm the Trump candidate."
- The Democratic got respectable support with Hispanics, as well as young people, but women across the whole spectrum played the biggest role. Unmarried women, white college women, and under 50 white working class women all raised their vote since October, no doubt motivated by the abortion issue.
- Democrats had the advantage by a couple of points in every area of grassroots voter contact.
- Defying previous midterms, independents divided fairly equally, in fact, favoring the Senate candidates in this
 poll. And despite the intense partisan consolidation, our poll shows that some moderate Republicans and Cheney
 conservatives broke ranks. That was felt in specific House and Senate races.
- And in actual battleground contests, the individual campaigns prioritized their efforts to help families with the cost of living, reassured voters early on the opposition to defunding the police, and opposed the Biden administration on border policy. The top priorities of our voters were the cost of living and inflation by far, but then, "white extremists and the future of democratic elections," then abortion and climate change.

What happened?

- Inflation and cost of living were the top national issues, and they were national. Governors of both parties were
 popular and did well promoting their own economic progress and policies. But voters did expect candidates for
 the House and Senate to address the spiking inflation and cost of living. They left them feeling angry and
 dissatisfied.
- In our polls, Democrats trailed Republicans by only 3 points on who would do better with the cost of living the top issue, along with inflation. But Democrats nationally went mute, fearing talking about inflation would help Republicans. Silence did and the Republicans' advantage grew to 6 points in this election poll. The cost of living was the very top priority for those who voted Democratic, and yet none cited any economic reason for voting Democratic this year. Again, it is hard not to say, "It's the economy, stupid" to Democratic strategists and leaders.
- Failure of national Democrats to address the economy meant rural areas and white working class communities
 were a political wasteland. But cost of living was also the top issue for Democrats, Black, Hispanic, and Asian
 voters. Turnout was down for Blacks and Hispanics and Democratic support for Asian American voters.
- Crime was a top issue for many Democratic base voters, and a quarter of Blacks and half of Hispanics and Asian
 voters trusted Republicans, more than Democrats to address the issue. That could have impacted turnout and
 Democrats' future prospects. With Democrats trailing Republicans by 10 points on crime and 16 points on who
 would be "much better," Democrats have a lot of work.
- This poll shows the continuing risk of a Republican challenge centered on borders and crime. Trump may have been weakened in this election, but another leader with that message poises an accelerated risk. Democrats have to address the border issue, too.

What now?

- We tested the cost of living message that begins with people have "not seen a pay raise" in years and the contrast with what Republicans and Democrats are doing on the cost of living. It is even stronger in this Election Day poll. It speaks a top economic issue for all voters and top one for Democrats. It is also the top issue for Black, Hispanic, and Asian voters. It also wins over working class voters broadly and allows Democrats to make further electoral gains.
- Two-thirds rate the economy negatively and "no pay raise" is the top recall of our message, yet Democrats did not prioritize
 the economy in this election and the President is still trying to convince people this is a good economy. This may be the
 toughest to make progress on.
- This poll shows the power of a crime message that funds the police dramatically and distances the party from the extreme fringe who support defunding the police. This poll showed that even a simulated race with Trump's save America candidate, we gain two points when speaking to both the cost of living AND crime.
- Democrats are at risk, this poll shows with Hispanics and Asian voters if they do not rethink what they prioritize, their policy
 offer, consciously battling for all in our coalition, and acknowledging past mistakes and having an inclusive vision where all
 make progress in America.
- That prioritizing helping families with the cost of living over all other issues because no pay raise forever and period of hyper-inflation, supporting families that helped families, like reducing health care costs and the Child Tax Credit, the last uniquely popular among Hispanics. Recognizing that all parts of the base want to see Democrats press for greater equality and offer a vision of America where all make progress.
- Democrats had the advantage in 2022 in every area of grassroots. This year showed the advantages of campaigning for every vote and community and showing Democrats win in rural areas too.
- Bottomline, American are facing hyper-inflation and a cost of living crisis, and they were looking for Democrats to provide help. As mad as it is that Democrats came to close to holding on to the House, our polling and others, showed them with a small lead. Our polling then and now, says, had Democrats taken on the biggest, historic problems, we could have had an even more historic election. Democrats and the country do not have to settle for the parties continuing to battle to a draw.















The consolidation of Democrats happened because of abortion, protecting democratic elections and Medicare and social security; no economic issues a factor




Below is a list of reasons to vote against the Republican for Congress. Which THREE are most important for you?





Democratic voters prioritized cost of living and inflation, but then white extremism, followed by climate change and health care


Please select the THREE issues you think are most pressing for the United States.








GOP vote driven by inflation & prices, & then, borders, crime & defund police



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
WHY REPUBLICAN FOR CONGRESS



These are some ways that candidates, campaigns, and other organizations try to reach people before elections. Please select all of the ways that you were contacted or received information before the election.






How do you feel about the way things are going in the country today?


Generally speaking, would you say things in this country are heading in the right direction, or are they off on the wrong track?






Most pressing: inflation & cost of living, along with crime, economy, & border




The surprise, close 2022 contest



Democrats dug out of the hole in the Spring, moved to 3-point lead at end of Congress, and ended just short of parity


Thinking about the election for Congress in your district in November 2022, will you vote for -- the Democratic candidate or the Republican candidate?

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
2018 vs. 2020 vs. 2022 CONGRESSIONAL VOTE



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






The 2024 presidential begins tougher, with Democrats trailing by 6 points: see emerging problems with Blacks, Hispanic, & under 50 white working class

Now, thinking far ahead to the election for President in November 2024. Will you vote for the Democratic candidate for President or the Republican candidate for President?




What if Democrats engaged on cost of living?



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Taking on the crime problem




Democrats' proposed crime message equal to GOP anti-city message, despite trailing by 10 points on who is better on crime

(POLICE/CRIME) Democrats say the rise in crime is unacceptable and people need to live in safe communities. That starts with having more police who are respected. It is a tough job, and we should fund, not defund the police. Our plan adds 100,000 more police. At the same time, it includes urgent reforms, including better training and accountability to prevent excessive use of force and racial profiling that singles out Blacks or Latinos. Those very communities want us to get behind law enforcement and fighting violent crime as a top priority with all the resources at our disposal.


(CRIME/DEFUND) Republicans say Joe Biden and Democrats' soft-on-crime policies have destroyed American cities, emboldened criminals, and put Americans in harm's way. Democrats' attacks on the 2nd Amendment will not combat the crime wave they created. Violent crime has spiked across the country, with fourteen major Democrat-run cities setting all-time high homicide records. Biden has not stood with law enforcement, but rather surrounded himself with radical defund the police supporters.




The vote shifted 2 points to the Democrats among those who heard the crime message
